

CHIRST THE KING

"The king who reigns will never cease."

On the 25th November we celebrated the solemnity of our Lord Jesus Christ, commonly referred to as the feast of Christ the king.

After the usual Sunday morning masses, each zone was given an hour to come together as a community and reflect on readings as the Blessed Sacrament was exposed.

Later that evening, our parishioners were asked to gather at St. Peter's chapel for a short time to ponder on a session led by Fr. Nigel. Few children of our parish were asked to dress as angels for the procession that ended at St. Anne's parish. Three other neighbouring parishes (Gloria church, St. Joseph, St. Anne's) also concluded their processions at St. Anne's.

The main focus of this gathering was to come together as one family to celebrate the feast of Christ the King of the lost, the lonely, the least and the last. After each parish assembled at St. Mary's ICSE another procession was conducted around the football ground and then entered the church. An adoration service was conducted

by each priest of the various parishes followed by a solemn benediction. Thereafter, everyone was served with a cup of tea and snacks as they spent time in fellowship.



St. Anthony's Community - Zone 1

Every month at Nasir Palace, we hold cluster meetings with each family taking turns to host these meetings. The Word of God is read followed by Gospel sharing and discussion. This is followed by praying the Holy Rosary.

In September, in preparation for the birthday of Our Blessed Mother, families in our community contributed towards the purchase of grains which was donated to various Homes.

In October, our animators along with the help of a few community members put up food stalls during the Novena days in preparation for the Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary, the profits of which were handed over to our Parish Priest for the Missions.

On the occasion of the Feast of Christ the King, Zones 1, 2 & 3 got together and conducted the first hour of the 13-hour Adoration held in the church. In the evening all our parishioners met at St. Peter's Chapel and went in a procession to St. Anne's Church for a final Benediction.

The animators of Community 1 meet every month with Fr. Bosco, our spiritual director.

Two of our animators who belong to the Legion of Mary, regularly visit the sick and lonely.

Holy Cross Community - Zone 2 & 3

We conducted the following activities in our zone during the period September to November 2019. Our Community experienced the blessing of our Blessed Mother, when the Statue of Our Lady of Fatima visited the families in our community.

Both the PPC members visited all the families in our community and interacted with them.

Four Cluster groups were formed with one senior and one junior animator in each group

During Feast of the Nativity of Our Lady in September, our Community Animators collected funds from the families in our community which was used for purchase of food grains etc. for different charity homes. Our Zone also conducted the Novena Mass and sang in the choir.

In preparation for Rosary Feast, our Community conducted the Novena on the day assigned to us and also had a choir. We also participated in the Fete with great enthusiasm by putting up food stalls, a games stall and raffles.

We have our Zonal Animators meetings every month and the minutes of the meeting are maintained. Zone 2&3 along with Zone 1 conducted the holy hour on Feast of Christ the King and also participated in the prayerful procession from St. Peter's Chapel to St. Anne's Parish for the final Benediction.

The Light of Unity Community - Zone 4

In September, in preparation for the Feast of the Nativity of Our Lady, the animators of Community 4, visited the families for contributions and also wholeheartedly assisted in the purchase of food grains, etc. which were donated to various charitable homes in Mumbai.

In October for the Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary, the animators and members of the community came together and actively participated and animated the Novena on the day assigned to our community. Ms. Dionisia D'Silva, our animator, prepared a meaningful liturgy for the Mass while others recited the Rosary and lead the congregation in singing.

Members of the community as well as the animators assisted in preparing food items for our community stall on the second day of the Fete and the proceeds collected were given for the Missions.

In November, on the Feast of Christ the King, the animators and a few lectors assisted in conducting the Holy Hour of Adoration for our community. In the evening, members of our Community participated in the procession from St. Peter's Chapel to St. Anne's Church for the final Adoration service.

Since we have over 80 families, the Statue of Our Lady of Fatima has been going around in our community since the month of October.

Ashirvad Community - Zone 5

In the month of September the animators had a door to door collection from the people of the zone 5. With the money collected, we purchased and donated various food grains as requested by the church. We also helped distribution of the grains to All Saints Home which is in our zone.

In the month of October we had a First Friday Mass at All Saints Home for the inmates on October 4th 2019. After the Mass, snacks were served to the inmates with funds given by the animators. All our animators were present.

We also had the Statue of Our Lady of Fatima going round the homes in our Community during October. For the Rosary Feast, our Community put up a food stall on the second day of the fete. The food items were prepared by the zone animators and two families. The proceeds from the sale of the food items were given to the Church for the missions.

Zonal meeting with all the animators, Fr. Shavito and Sr. Sheela was held in the KG classroom after the evening mass. Intercessory prayers were held on Tuesday, 12th Nov 2019 and all zonal animators and Sr. Sheela lifted up all the sick in our zone in prayer.

A Mass was offered for all the deceased members from our zone on the 27th Nov 2019.

Marian Community - Zone 6

As is the custom over the years, members of Zone 6 assembled at the Miranda Cross for their monthly Rosary on the 27th September, 31st October and 28th November at 7:45 pm.

During the festivities celebrating the Birthday of Our Blessed Mother, our Parish conducted Fund Raising to assist six charitable homes in our areas. Zone 6 contributed towards purchase and delivery of adult diapers for two Homes - Ashadan (Sisters of Charity) at Nagpada and Piety Home in Dabul.

Visitation of families in the Parish was restarted by Fr. Nigel and he along with Fr. Shavito scheduled the visitation according to zones. Animators from Zone 6 planned and coordinated the visits and ensured every family available in the zone was visited. This was deeply appreciated by some of our elderly home-bound and afflicted residents. An earnest effort is being made to ensure the Eucharist is made available periodically to the home-bound.

Our Zonal Social Gathering was celebrated on Sunday 15th Sept at the 9:30 am Holy Mass followed by a Social of fun and games attended by young and old. It was a wonderful event with music and dancing. Many enjoyable games, group songs, contests, housie, spot prizes, refreshments and lunch was part of this lively and greatly appreciated program. A true sense of community living was experienced by one all.

In preparation of our Feast Day celebrations, the mother and daughter combo of Freda and Amber Collaco from our zone began a month long training for all our parishioners willing to learn Line Dancing. It was a tremendous success and was the talk of the parish.

Many in our Zone contributed greatly towards the Parish Fete celebrating our Parish Feast. The fete was a runaway success and a true revival of the spirit of our Parish. A budding talent from our Zone, Shanaika De Souza portraying herself as Delilah won the very entertaining

Biblical Fancy Dress Competition. The zone came together once again with their culinary brilliance to prepare some mouth-watering dishes i.e. Sorpotel, Sannas, Choris Pao, Chicken Vindaloo, Chicken Cutlets, Beef/chutney sandwiches, Pan Rolls, Cup Cakes, Custard et al for the food stall. It was an awesome effort by all contributing to a grand success.

Our zone deeply mourns the sad demise of Ivor Wroughton, husband of Carol Wroughton and father of Zane and Iillian, on 10th November.

St. Joseph the Worker (Zone 7) & St. Roque (Zone 8)

Our 'Spry September' was filled with a sanctimonious celebration of the Feast of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Both zones 7 and 8 made eleemosynary donations towards the supplies that were provided to the different homes and orphanages in the city. The ALM association of the Matharpacady Village also conducted their AGM meeting during this month of the year.

And with our spirits ever lively for the most awaited feast of the year, we had an 'Outstanding October'. In preparation for the Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary, parishioners of both Zones 7 and 8 got-in-on-the-act of making this year's parish feast an indelible memory. We praised the Almighty as we prepared and partook in the Novena celebrations on the 6th and 7th days of the Novenas. The families of Zone 8 put up a stall on the last day of the parish fete. In case you didn't happen to catch a glimpse of our stall, we prepared some mouth-watering and finger-licking items to ingest and satisfy tummies both young and old. Kudos to Mr. Merwyn D'mello and Ms. Caroline Pereira who were crowned Emperor and Queen of the Rosarian Crown Night, Zone 8 is marveled at your win. And we all had a fun-filled time at the Feast Day Social.

We also accompanied the Prayer group cell of the parish on the 27th of October, as they march in pray with the Jericho Cross in and around the village. As we kept this devotion to Our Lady of the Rosary alive, we brought the statue of Our Lady of Fatima into the hearts and homes of some families in Zone 8. This took us right into November. We bid adieu to our Blessed Mother in the first week of November. We celebrated the triumph of good over evil on the feast of Christ the King and acclaimed him as 'King of the Universe', with a solemn and spiritual adoration together with Zones 7 & 9 followed by a victorious walk on the streets of Mazgaon to St. Anne's Church.

Our daily evening prayers, evergreen with devotion take place at the Holy Cross Oratory. We also honor and venerate the statue of Our Lady at 14/A as we raise our voices in prayer and thanksgiving on a weekend of the month.

The bountiful programs of providing 'Food' & 'Medicine' that have been started lately after the Parish Feast, serve Food and Medical aids for around 5 parishioners in our Zone.

Dia Gupta:


"Receiving Holy Communion I feel the presence of Jesus in my heart and am full of joy and peace:


We welcome all newcomers to our ministry. May the Lord be in your heart and on your lips that you may worthily proclaim his holy word.



FOOD & MEDICINE PROJECTS



"The hope of the poor will not perish for ever" (Ps 9:19). These words of the Psalm remain timely. They express a profound truth that faith impresses above all on the hearts of the poor, restoring lost hope in the face of injustice, sufferings and the uncertainties of life.

Tiffin Service for the Needy & Home Bound

"A generous person will be blessed, for he gives some of his food to the poor" Proverbs 22:9

There is no better verse to describe the new initiative undertaken by our Parish Priest. On the Feast of "Our Lady of the Rosary", our Parish Priest, Fr. Nigel Barrett, announced a project for the benefit of the "Needy & Home Bound" parishioners of our Parish. Starting October 8, 2019, ten tiffin's consisting of a veg & non-veg meal to suffice for lunch & dinner are being delivered 7 days a week.

A Catholic, home-caterer has been identified, keeping in mind the palate/needs of the sick & elderly. Jacinta, a successful entrepreneur, has lots of experience in running a catering unit from her home, thus ensuring and maintaining high standards of hygiene & quality. She goes out of her way to cook nutritious, tasty, authentic home-cooked meals with less salt & spice.

The food is delivered to our Church which in turn, is delivered to these families. Robert D'Souza from Sankalp Niketan (Zone 4) - an energetic, enthusiastic young lad, full of zest for life, painstakingly walks around our Parish, delivering the food to different homes, keeping in mind the specific individual requirements of the recipient.

We have received some wonderful feedback about the taste & quality of the food. The families are very happy as they do not need to worry about their next meal. They thank the entire team of our Priests, Zonal animators & Parishioners for their thoughtfulness & generosity, showering them abundantly with blessings.

Community Care Project

On 17th November 2019, the Third World Day of the

Poor, our Parish Priest, Fr. Nigel Barrett, announced a "Community Care" project. This project aims to provide medical assistance to parishioners suffering from various ailments who find it difficult to purchase medicines on a regular, monthly basis.

Besides the regular medication for hypertension / diabetes / cholesterol, we have some parishioners who are wheelchair bound, bedridden, in coma, undergoing dialysis etc. These patients need a lot of financial, medical & emotional support. To ease the already stressed & burdened family, our Priests have decided to step in and offer medical support by tying up with a local Chemist to hand-deliver all the medication to the patients.

A process has been set up to ensure that the required due diligence is done. Parishioners who need medical aid have to approach their zonal co-ordinators. A medical enquiry committee, consisting of 3 members from various zones, will review the case. They will visit the homes to meet the patients & check on medical / hospital bills to verify the case. Patients/caretaker need to submit an application letter, the original doctor's prescription & the latest copy of a 6-months bank statement. Once the medical committee is satisfied that the case is genuine, they will fill in a "Financial Aid for Sick" form giving details of the case. The final approval will come from the Parish Priest. The above process ensures a thorough check at every stage, making sure that the parishioners' contribution is not misused.

Once the patients are on the medical list, the chemist will deliver medicines 3 times a month. The Church will settle all invoices with the chemist directly, thus offering families the much-required support as their medicines are home-delivered without any financial strain. This process ensures the patients always have their medicines & the Church has a better negotiation capacity.

All the recipients of the above services are free to put in their contribution, however small, to the community fund. A receipt from the Church office will be given for the same.

Our Priests take the opportunity to thank every Parishioner for their generous support to the fund.

This presentation helped the youth get a better understanding about the various skills required to become a good leader. Each day concluded with the Eucharist celebration, games and fun activities.













RECIPE SECTION



Christmas is the most joyful time of the year. The month of December itself feels different from the rest of the year. A season of joy waiting for Baby Jesus. And a time for making sweets and distributing them to our neighbours and friends.

From the early 60s I have been making a variety of Christmas sweets.

The credit of my sweet making talent must be given to late Mrs. Stella Vaz my loving relative and neighbor. She patiently taught me the secret of making Christmas Sweet till I perfected it. And till today I follow her recipes.

A few weeks before Christmas our neighbors would come together to make sweets. We helped each other to make our culculs, neuris and toffees. Aunty Stella as we fondly called her was our chief cook. The secret of toffee making is the timing, you had get it right. And we all depended on Aunty Stella for the timing. The children enjoyed scraping the remains from the chatty and relished the sweet. We used to have fun with a feeling of joy and bonding, with Christmas Carols playing in the background and snacks and tea for all who helped.

One of my best recipe loved by all is the Cashew nut toffee. Hope you enjoy making and eating it.

Cashew Nut Toffee

INGREDIENTS:

Half Kg Cashew nuts coarsely minced, Half kg Sugar, Quarter kg Butter, 1 cup milk, Colour - Green, 1 teaspoon Vanilla Essence

METHOD:

Boil 1 glass of water in a heavy base pan, add sugar and keep stirring till the sugar melts and slightly thickens. Keep the pan down and add butter. When melted add the minced Cashew nuts and milk. Stir well. Then keep the pan on slow flame and keep stirring till the mixture becomes thick. Add colour as required (just a quarter of a teaspoon). Lastly add one teaspoon Vanilla Essence. Keep stirring.

When the mixture starts to form tiny bubbles at the edge of the pan, pay attention. From now on give it your undivided attention and stir till the mixture begins to leave the side of the pan and starts to forms a lump. (Don't overcook the mixture as it will break while cutting.) Remove pan from heat. Immediately transfer the contents to a thali or a baking dish. Level the mixture with a base of a spoon to ensure an even surface. Grease the base of the spoon with butter to avoid the mixture from sticking.

(Grease the thali with butter so it does not stick and comes of easily after cutting. The thali should have a little depth)

When the toffee cools a bit slightly cut into diamond or square shaped pieces. Let it air overnight before preserving in a tin.

Break the bread into fine bits (not crumbs) and avoid the crust only the white part of the bread.

½ cup water

1 cup sugar

Ghee 3 tbls

Cashew nuts and black plums

METHOD:


Put the sugar and water in a vessel and stir till is become thick and sticky. Add the coconut and stir for 10 minutes so as to dry the moisture in the coconut. When the texture of the coconut is still soft add the broken bread, nuts and




black plums cut into bits stir and cook till it thickens add one the spoon ghee when it begins to collect like a ball add one more spoon ghee. Add 1 tsp of vanilla essence. Ready the plate and apply ghee to it. When the mixture begins to thicken pour it on the plate. Decorate it with bits of cashew nuts and black plums. When it cools cut it in slices.
